"2021 Tallest Sunflower Competition – Primary Schools in Burscough

he "Tallest Sunflower in Burscough Competition 2021" has commenced. Our five primary schools (pictured) are all competing for the coveted Burscough Sunflower cup and rosettes, the eternal glory of victory, plus the modest prize money.

In previous years this money has been ploughed back into gardening projects at the winning school. A crack team from Burscough Town Council delivered some sunflower seeds, growing canes and baby sunflowers to each of our five schools in early June. Some schools have already started the growing process with their own sunflower seed supplies.

The competition ends in September when the tallest sunflower in each school will be measured by officials from the "Tallest Sunflower in Burscough

Competition 2021" prize committee. Last year the winning sunflower was just under seven feet tall and it was grown at Burscough Village Primary School, the current defending champions.

There are few rules to the competition, which has previously seen the liberal deployment of nitrogen rich plant feed and liaison between chemistry and biology teachers to provide the best growing medium for the sunflowers. Grandparents have also been known to offer the odd growing tip. Local celebrity gardener Basil Cucumber provided a top tip: "Sunflowers like sunlight so plant them in a sunny spot."


The competition is on! Good luck to all our junior growers!

Fairey Swordfish Scale Model

n December 2019, Burscough Town Council granted funds to local

heritage group, "Images of Burscough and Surrounding Areas" to construct a scale model of a Fairey Firefly. A model of aircraft in use at HMS Ringtail Royal Naval Air Station
Burscough. The scale model was

completed by
Burscough man Alan Birch and
will be displayed at exhibitions and
will also tour local schools, depending
on restrictions.

Earlier this year Images of Burscough applied to the Town Council and was granted a further £450 to build a second scale model, this time of the Fairey Swordfish. The Swordfish was another Royal Navy Aircraft that saw service throughout World War II, it was a fabric covered torpedo carrying bi-plane. This aircraft type was based with various squadrons at HMS Ringtail and used in radar training and other exercises. The model will again be constructed by Alan Birch and post pandemic will be on display to the public at exhibitions and also will tour local schools. The two aircraft together will be a wonderful educational resource and will also generate a lot of positive publicity for the area both locally and nationally.

A legacy of the Swordfish can be found on the Burscough Industrial Estate, the former HMS Ringtail in the name Swordfish Business Park. The logo of Ringtail Retail Park also features an image of the Pegasus engine which powers the aircraft.

Many residents will remember that there have on a number of occasions had Fairey Swordfish displays over the monument, a truly noteworthy event as there are sadly only two Swordfishes in existence and both have flown over Burscough in recent years.

Burscough Town Council were keen to support the naval heritage of Burscough by funding these two models so that the memory of HMS Ringtail can be kept alive for future generations.

On Tuesday 8th June 2021, we welcomed the Chairman of the Town Council, Brian Kennedy and the members of the council to officially open the new infant playground. Miss Smith, Headteacher, commented "it is important that we listened to what the children of our school wanted from their new playground and therefore, we asked the Year 2 class to be heavily involved in the design to ensure that it was right. We are thrilled with the end result and the children love the treehouse and I have already seen several

Crabtree Lane drainage & environmental improvements

his project has been financed by the Town Council. It has been brought to fruition by the joint efforts of the Town Council and Burscough Flood Group (BFG), along with the cooperation of the landowners Mr Wilson and Mr Webster.

The scheme has entailed the installation of some 300 metres of pipework to divert the excess water from Crabtree Lane and the adjacent properties into a drainage ditch in the field behind the affected properties.

The work has greatly reduced the likelihood of these properties being flooded again, which has been the case over recent years.
