

We Remembered

Burscough Town came to a standstill in November as people remembered those who gave their lives and who have served our country. Two memorial services were held in November 2022. The Ringtail Memorial Service was held on Friday 11th November 2022 at the Memorial near Booths Supermarket. The service was led by Reverend Banbury. Dignitaries, school children, local people and ex-service personnel attended and laid wreaths at the memorial.

On Sunday 13th November 2022 Burscough came to a standstill. A memorial parade started at Lord Street and processed through the Town centre to the Memorial Gardens. It was moving to see so many people from Burscough Town join the parade or watch.



Burscough Town Council had to step in to

allow the Services to go ahead. The Civic Events Team, made up of Councillors, managed to put together one of the best Remembrance Services Burscough has held. A lot of thought, time, work, and preparation went into making this event a success.

Dear Residents

I trust that you are all well and had a good Christmas and New Year, despite the fact that we are all struggling with the effects of the rising cost of living, particularly the cost of gas and electricity.

My fellow Town Councillors and I, would like to wish everyone a "Happy New Year" and hope that the health and financial outlook will improve for everyone during the coming year.

The Town Council has limited financial resources but I would like say to all our residents that if you or anyone you know finds themselves in financial hardship and needs advice or help please speak to any Town Councillor or contact our Clerk (see members' contact details below) to see if we can help you.

Also, the Council has been working with a local primary school and a national mental health charity to provide funds to deal with mental health issues and the wellbeing of our residents. Again, if you feel you could benefit from such help, please contact our Clerk.

On a happier note I can now confirm that after a lot of hard work and negotiation, particularly by our Clerk, the Town Council has now successfully concluded an agreement with Lancashire County Council and Network Rail to lease the existing Burscough Bridge Interchange building and we will be moving into the refurbished building in the near future. The building will provide office space for our Clerk and Deputy but more importantly will provide a much-needed community space for use by local organisations and charity groups. More information will be made available regarding booking procedures for these rooms once the Town Council moves into the building.

In my capacity as Town Council Chairman I have a small amount of money available each financial year known as the "Chairman's Allowance". I can donate this money to any good cause that I feel is deserving and this year my allowance has helped to replace the water feature that was vandalised at the Methodist Church garden and also helped Burscough Litter Pickers to purchase insurance to cover volunteers when they are out on the streets picking up litter.

Finally for your information the Town Council has had to pass the distribution of this Newsletter to a local private firm due to the demise of the Champion newspaper which previously carried out this function. This will be the first edition to be distributed by this means and we would welcome your feedback over the coming months about the coverage and reliability of this new service.

Burscough has the first blue plaques in West Lancashire



Burscough has become the first area in West Lancashire to have Blue Plaques, and not just one but four. Edward Bridge MM BEM, Harriett Emma Mahood, Emma Vickers and Ernest John Rosbottom now have Blue Plaques situated at Burscough Wharf, for all to see. There are also information boards below giving some interesting facts on them and their deeds.

Families, friends, and representatives of Burscough Town Council were present for the unveiling in September 2022.

Local historian Michael Dawson was contacted by former Cllr Andrew Pritchard regarding Harriett Emma Mahood and thoughts on arranging a coveted Blue Plaque for her.

A couple of years prior to this Michael had discussed with a few others about how Edward Bridge MM, BEM could be best remembered and the possibility of having a Blue Plaque installed in Burscough for him, too.

Funding for this, the first part of the project, was successfully made via the National Lottery Heritage Fund through a local voluntary community group -'Images of Burscough and Surrounding Areas'which met all the criteria set out to apply for grants to fund such projects.

Due to the Covid pandemic in 2020, the project was delayed resulting in the first two plaques and interpretation boards being installed at Burscough Wharf in September 2020, with an unveiling ceremony postponed.

This gave the team time to plan the second part of the project with a further two Blue Plaques and boards to be installed, this time recognising Emma Vickers and Ernest Rosbottom.

This part of the project was generously funded by Burscough Town Council, and in August the plaques and boards were installed again at Burscough Wharf, who from day one have been fully supportive of the project.

With restrictions lifted, an official unveiling ceremony with friends and relatives of all four invited to attend along with many of those involved in the project could be organised.

This took place on Sunday 11th November 2022, with Lawrence Critchley giving a short introduction before relatives unveiled the blue plaques and boards.

A special thank you to Trevor Bridge (Edward's great nephew) who designed the plaques, boards and also the two booklets which tell the stories of all four blue plaque recipients.

Trevor travelled over from France to be at the unveiling ceremony, with members of Emma Vickers family travelling from all over the country to be here.

These are the first Blue Plaques in West Lancashire and this has been a very worthwhile project.

The booklets are free to collect from Burscough Wharf.

Defibrillator – READY FOR ACTION HELP SAVE A LIFE

Burscough Town Council are passionate about the health and wellbeing of all the residents in Burscough. To this end two new defibrillators have been purchased and placed in refurbished telephone kiosks on Manor Road and Richmond Avenue.

These are further additions to the defibrillator already in position on the A59 outside Purely Pizza.

The defibrillators have been registered on The Circuit, which is connected to North West Ambulance Service. To help save a life ring 999, the emergency telephone number, and they will give you the unique code which will enable access to the equipment.

The defibrillators are easy to use, to start you press the on button and then the device will talk you through all the steps.

the device will talk you through all the steps. If the casualty has a pulse, the defibrillator will not work as it would not be required and therefore cannot harm the casualty. Defibrillators are small machines which can 'shock' a person's heart into restarting after a cardiac arrest. If this can be done in the first few minutes, patients have a 60-70 per cent chance of making a full recovery. They are easy to use, easy to carry and they won't deliver a shock unless it is required. There is no clinical training required to be able to use the machine.

In the 2023, we hope to provide some training sessions for anyone who would like further information on how they are used. For information contact the Town Council office.

A new year report from the local food bank

The food banks around West Lancs have all been experiencing increased demand during the last few months of 2022, but the report from the Burscough Food Bank notes that they were also experiencing increased donations. They now also have a clothes bank which is very popular, especially with young mums and in the run-up to Christmas they have had toys and Christmas hampers on offer too.

Jackie Moore, one of four coordinators, who head up the Burscough Food Bank commented: 'The generosity of local

people is just amazing. Thank you to all who have helped.' She also noted that the Village schools are great supporters of the Food Bank, spreading the word via parents and children about the need to build community support.

Jackie noted 'Our next venture is to provide expert benefit, debt and well-being support via a partnership with Compassion Acts, starting January.'

Businesses can now go solar, with no penalty

f you are starting to investigate solar energy you might want to have a look at the array on the Town Council's new office space, the former Burscough Bridge Interchange building.

Cllr Cynthia Dereli admits to having had a long-held desire to see solar panels on the Interchange roof.

"Around 2010, I was chairing a small voluntary organization committed to spreading the word on green issues. The station roof seemed to me to be crying out for solar panels given its position – south facing and not overlooked, but the Burscough Renewable Energy Companies remit limited it to supporting the installation of solar on public/community buildings. Sadly the station didn't fit the bill" said Cllr Dereli.

So why have we not seen solar panels appearing on other buildings since then?

Well, the first failure of government in relation to renewable energy has been to fail to support a growing industry and the second, a failure to encourage householders to invest in renewables with even the smallest of carrots.

But from the point of view of businesses who want to help save the planet there is a glimmer of hope!

Up until 2022 adding solar panels to an industrial building also added to the rates bill. But now the UK government have had a change of heart and scrapped that penalty.

There is still no payment for any electricity you feed back into the grid, but businesses are likely to use most of their electricity usage in the daytime and less after dark. This would mean less need for a battery for storage or less 'waste' of energy generated - at last an opportunity for businesses to contribute to saving the planet.

For local businesses, therefore, it looks as though this might be a great time to install solar on your building.

This change needs to be publicised. And ... if local businesses go electric can we all look forward to more electric cars gliding passed us and cleaner air for pedestrians? This should be a win-win for everyone.

Xmas illuminations

Rights reflecting off colourful ornaments, and a visit from old Saint Nick... As often said, Christmas is the most wonderful time of the year and decorating for Christmas is one of the most joy-inducing parts of the holiday season.

With new shimmering lights illuminating the traditional 25ft Memorial Gardens Christmas tree Burscough's countdown to Christmas 2022 got under way on the last Friday in November. And it was certainly a case of 'out with the old and in with the new' as 22 brand new festive lamppost lighting motifs made their debut appearance above the main village road to provide a winter wonderland of lighting.

With the previous motifs looking tired and dim after several years of use, planning for the new village lights started as early as February as the Town Council's Street Scene Working Group worked closely with new contractors, Ormskirk-based IllumiDex UK Ltd, to design and manufacture the new brightly coloured festive motifs for the village lampposts. And using more up to date and economical super energy efficient LED string and rope lights will greatly reduce costs by using almost 90% less energy than traditional light bulbs.

The Christmassy makeover theme continued with the repositioning of an all white light 12ft cone tree next to the entrance of St John the Baptist Church, with two new red and green cone



trees taking up a prominent position on the corner of Mill Lane in front of the Burscough granite stone. And for the fourth successive Christmas, 50 solar powered hanging Christmas trees provided a twinkling display from one end of the village to the other.

Snow at Christmas tends to be a rare sight, and for 2022 there was as usual no sign of a winter wonderland of snow, or indeed the three wise men. Notwithstanding, the Town Council hope that the new lighting features brought some yuletide spirit to the town's residents and visitors alike, and would like to thank all those who took time out to post comments on social media or email the Town Council office.
